Obituaries

Arthur James Hutchinson, M.B.E. (1945-51).

Arthur played ice hockey for Haringay and enjoyed playing drums in a band. After leaving school at 18, he joined his father in business at Spitalfields Market. Together they expanded the business and he later took over when his father died. He married Shirley in 1955 and lived in Cheshunt - they had three sons, Christopher, Robert and Brian all of whom produced much appreciated grandchildren for Arthur and Shirley. When Spitalfields Market was moved to Nine Elms, the work that Arthur put into this enormous task was rightly rewarded with his MBE.

Shirley and Arthur moved to a delightfully restored dairy in the tiny Essex village of Tilty. They enjoyed the countryside and Arthur reserved his "plot" in the churchyard amid trees and fields.

Resting after lunch on December 5th last year, he complained of a pain and was unable to get up. He was rushed to hospital but sadly died next day.

The funeral held at Tilty was attended by family, friends and many traders from the market. His youngest son read "Death is nothing at all" by Canon Henry Scott-Holland at the service and afterwards everyone went on to the Down Hall Hotel near Hatfield Heath.

before you can be sure of a very warm welcome. No need to book, just turn up and find us in the vicinity of Table No.1 (Past the Bar, turn left, straight on then look for a copy of the Newsletter) from 12.30 for lunch or from 7.00 in the evening. We are still hoping that someone will set up a similar get-together in their own area. It takes very little organisation and we will give any volunteer ideas on venue, publicity, etc. Just arrange a nucleus of three or four people to ensure a pleasant meeting and you could be surprised who else turns up.

Gunpowder Mills. Following last years highly enjoyable visit to Bletchley Park, we felt that a similar venue "nearer home" might attract greater numbers. We are therefore planning a visit to the Royal Gunpowder Mills near Waltham Abbey later this summer. Its exhibitions and displays are housed in buildings dated back to the 1790's illustrating over 300 years of history. The Mills played a part in technology from gunpowder to the bouncing bomb and development of materials used in everyday objects such as the golf ball. Interactive computer displays help in recreating explosions and scientific inventions. Visitors are free to explore a large area of the site including a wildlife watchtower. The many historic structures and canals combine with extensive wooded areas to create a hidden world with a thriving ecology. Admission cost is in the region of £6 including free parking, with reductions for concessions and groups. If we can gather a sufficiently large group together we will also have the services of an experienced guide who can offer insights into this previously secret world.

sally agreed to be one of the most enjoyable events for many years. Unless we can attract greater numbers however, we will be unable to continue this longest established event on our social calendar. Without greater attendance, the economics of the function are simply not viable and we will have to look at poorer alternatives. If you are one of those who do enjoy this event, talk to your friends, arrange to meet them, organise a group table - unfortunately with any social event you can no longer just turn up and expect your friends to be there.

School News

We are pleased to report that the Technology Status appeal has been successful. A major sponsorship has topped up the school fund-raising effort and donations with the ESA guaranteeing a loan sufficient to reach the target of £50,000. More details to follow with a report on the implications of this to the school as they become clearer and what steps are to be taken next.

An OFSTED inspection took place during wk/c 11th February. A parents evening took place in late January to answer questions, take views on the schools performance and discuss how it

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will affect pupils, parents and school. A new School Development Plan is being prepared and the inspection will give and indication of what priorities should be.

The London Education Authority has asked the school to take an additional entry of 30 students next September. The issue is a concern to all staff who feel the Lower site building is already full - in fact there are already nearly 30 students per year over the "standard number" of 243. The numbers attracted by the continued success and reputation of the school must eventually start to have an adverse effect and the LEA must take responsibility for any drop in standards, whether educational, behavioural or in the wide range of ex-curricular activities which benefit the pupils. There is an unwelcome increase in the number of pupils who appear to be resorting to violence to settle disputes. Much of this may be put down to modern attitudes and standards perhaps but whether or not you believe in the principles of comprehensive education, the pressures put on today's teachers by overcrowding and sheer weight of numbers can only have a deleterious effect on the life of the school.

Meanwhile the wide range of activities undertaken by pupils and reported in previous newsletters continues. Music, sport, voluntary work, charity fund raising and educational visits have been taking place both at home and abroad.

Special mention must be made of the Year 9 Football team who, when we last heard, were at the top of the Enfield league, semi-finalists in both the Enfield and Middlesex cups and in the last 16 in the English Schools Cup.

Shades of the Sixties! Incidentally, why is it that all references are made to Year7 through to Year 12 and no mention of first to fifth forms, yet there is still a thriving Sixth Form?

Chairman's Report

You may have noticed that there are no adverts for volunteers for **Association Officers** in this edition but does this mean we no longer require help? On the contrary. We desperately need people to fill vacancies.

So what is involved for each job? Currently there are not more than three or four letters per year to write, so the **Secretary's** job consists mainly of writing up and distributing just five sets of minutes and Agendas annually.

The **Social Co-ordinator** has very little to organise for our Whitewebbs get-togethers or any other visits such as to Bletchley Park or the Gunpowder Mills. Ticket distribution is needed for the Magic Circle visit and the Annual Dinner - other Dinner tasks are covered by the committee.

The **Newsletter Editor** has probably the highest profile job in that most members think of their quarterly update as "the Association". The worst case scenario is writing four Newsletters of four pages each per year, taking extracts from members written correspondence and School Newsletters. In reality this is reduced by photographs and greatly helped by members sending emails or letters on disk, both of which can be transferred directly into the newsletter format.

Apart from the secretary, the **ESA Co-ordinator** is the only position which requires the holder to live within reach of the school. This job is still developing but currently involves maintaining con-

tact with the ESA and the school and distributing our Newsletter to them. Currently Peter Francis does much of this work and would be happy to advise and help in the post. We are grateful to the school for facilitating reunions and committee meetings - this role will ensure our continued co-operation and help us to assist the school in the future. If the Newsletter is the present fulcrum of the Association, then a Web-site is the future - and the sooner the better! The success of recent group reunions would not have been possible without the use of the Internet. We need our own web-site if as an Association we are not to be left behind and eventually dwindle and die! Thanks to generous donations we already have the software, we have contacts and help but we don't yet have a **Web-site controller**. Even if you are not confident that you have the expertise to fully develop a site to its full potential, can you help us get it off the ground? We had hoped to advertise the Dinner on the friendsreunited web-site, but were not even able to arrange that successfully!

Last and definitely not least is the position of **Database Manager**. This is not so much an Officer, more an ongoing role. In the long term it is vital as the means of old scholars maintaining contact. We cannot rely on Contact web-sites as they only work if people register on them. Not everybody is on the Net and many of those that are do not bother to register. With a little detective work, we can build on web-site registrations

and help to fulfil the Association's primary objective. This is a job which will need ongoing commitment rather than a requirement to meet particular deadlines.

So all in all, although there is a lot of work to be done, no individual job takes up too much time or effort. Unfortunately they do in total - and in addition to the Chairman's role, I am trying to hold down all but two of them - which means not one of them is being done properly! All of the other committee members are more than pulling their weight - they each have other commitments and anyway have long records of service to the Association. If we cannot find fresh blood to take on these jobs, then your committee must revise our priorities in the light of our limited personal resources. The situation cannot go on and something has to give. Personally I do not intend to walk away completely but certainly I cannot afford the time to carry on as at present. I must decide which one job is of most use to the Association and the others must go by the board unless other people take them on. Do we progress as an Association or do we break up into a few small unconnected groups? Non Nobis Solum?

If you have always thought you would like to do something for your old school friends, now is the time. Please do not hang back because you feel you are not qualified, if you have some time give me a ring and see what we need and how you can help. **F.W.**
