Q left during, and Miss Fothergill at the end of, the 56/7 School year when Sam Elengorn and Doris Staples took over as Senior Master and Mistress. Emma also left early during the year and Miss Owers arrived after Miss Staples was promoted – Solly Galin had left in the summer of 56.

Of those in the photograph, Mr. Bartlett and Miss Quinton left in the summer of 57 to get married, Mr. Buckle and Peter Simmonds also left then, as did Miss Taylor, Miss Brennan and Miss Wrigley. (Graham Briggs arrived with several others in September).

This process of elimination puts the date of the photo as Summer Term, 1957.

OBITUARIES

Arthur Spencer writes: We went to the Southgate College Opera a couple of weeks ago. The programme mentioned the death of one of their Friends of Southgate College Opera – K.T. Beddall – who left a substantial legacy to them to assure the future of the company.

I suspect that this might be Kenneth Beddall who was at the ECS probably from 1939 and left in 1946 at the end of my First Form year.

He was Deputy Head Boy, I believe, and in Andrew House, like me! He was my 'head of table' at the dreaded school dinners, so as a junior, I suppose that I knew him a little. He was always very interested in music and ran the music society. He studied physics and became a science teacher at Tottenham Grammar I believe.

If I am correct, it may be that you will find someone of his generation to expand on my brief comments.

Ronald Alexander Rush 1919-24.5.2003

Ronald joined the school in 1931 and for the whole of his life was a keen member of the old scholars. After war service with the RAF in India, he joined the Nestle Company and was a member of their international business school, run in Switzerland in conjunction

with Harvard Business School. He spent his whole business career with the company rising to senior management and serving as chairman of British Food Export Council for which he received his O.B.E. in 1983. He was also elected a member of the Worshipful Company of Grocers. After his retirement, he was very active in charity work, recording talking books and gaining an award for his branch of the Cancer Shop in Sunningdale for the highest earnings in the county. He was a founder member of the Friends of Hyde Park and Kensington Gardens where his proudest achievements were the refurbishing of the Peter Pan statue and the erection of the Queen Mother gates. His family will plant a tree there in his memory. Among his enthusiasms were skiing, travel, cricket and walking and as a member of the London Group he organised the May walking Weekends for several years always walking the course first to make sure every detail was in place.

His greatest love was theatre and he was active in amateur dramatics until his death. From early days with the ECOS group until his last involvement with the Quince Players of Sunningdale, for whom he directed the Christmas pantomime for many years, this was his major delight. His funeral service ended with a selection from Noel Coward, whose proudest boast was that he had "a talent to amuse". Certainly this sentiment was shared by R.A.R. an old scholar who made the most of his life. The funeral was a family affair only and there is to be no

memorial service, but if anyone wishes to mark his passing, the family suggest any cancer charity of your choice.

Pat Tidbury (nee Johnson) writes from her home in Australia: For those who do not know, and might be interested, after leaving school in February 1944 and spending too many months in a factory on National Service, I was released to complete a speech and drama course at L.A.M.D.A. in 1943. Lack of funds sent me off looking for work, and in January 1947, I was lucky enough to get a job with American Overseas Airline, which were merged with Pan-Am in 1950. Many travel miles and happy days later. I met and married an Australian in 1957 and with a young (very) daughter, we left for Hong Kong where we spent seven years before settling in Sydney late in 1964. I worked in Radio Hong Kong, mostly as an announcer for six years, which must have been while Bruce Goddard was with the BBC? We were a BBC subsidiary, taking much from their overseas service. I did visit ECS briefly in 1964 and came to an AGM, meeting Raymond and Jean Tabor, who I had known at school and in the Thespians, also Ralph Christmas and Ted Lawrence among others. I also keep in touch with Basil Hoskins from time to time. I am enclosing a photo of Prefects taken in Summer 1943 – I repeated 5th that year, trying to improve my

maths marks – I did not! However, I'm sure Mr. Morris, Mr. Akhurst and 'Q' would be pleased to know I have never over or undercharged a passenger or put more people on an aircraft than we had seats!

I lost touch with ECSOSA for a lot of years, when I came here (Australia) but as this is the 27th home I have made in 77 years, I guess I could be forgiven.

However, it has given me great joy to catch up in the last ten years or more. I am very lucky to see and talk with Gerry Bailey (also knew him from Raglan Road days) and his wife Judy. Margaret Cole rang me in late 1999, unfortunately we could not get together as it was over Christmas and New Year, but spoke to her brother Peter who lives in Sydney. I am about two hours north on the New South Wales Central Coast.

Through Gerry's internet, I received an E mail by post from Ted Lawrence. I was delighted to hear from him. I often wonder where others from the photo are now. I believe Doreen Ellis is a doctor in Bristol? Last time she rang me was in 1950 to say she was an MD – Peggy Ellis also got her PhD that year. I think Irene Wright died some years ago. She was a lovely girl – her brother Ron was in my class, but I had no idea he was connected until he wrote to the Newsletter. I owe him an apology for an incident in the Gym during a dancing class in 1938? Sorry Ron – he will know what I mean. I often see Bill Clarke's name mentioned, and think he is Renee Clarke's brother – did she go to Canada or Nova Scotia? So many memories and most of them very good – we were all so fortunate to attend ECS. Such marvellous teachers. Mr. Locke (Gus) once took me and Florrie Weir to London for the day in 1938 as we were not going away for a holiday – the

Tower of London, lunch, a movie (The Four Feathers), afternoon tea and a red rose for our mothers – he was such a nice man. Dr. Galin, who could never find his glasses which were always on his head! He was an old friend of my Dad – and dear Miss Emery. To whom I owe so much for her lunch time Elocution lessons, and her belief in my abilities – what a shame we can't thank them all. In closing, I fear I must contradict Miss Fothergill – something I wouldn't have dared if she was here! but we did lose one of the pupils in World War 2. Her name was Eileen Bawd and I think it was 1940 or 1941, when she was 14 or 15. She died when their air raid shelter was hit, and her parents were also killed.

Eileen had a serious heart condition, and had told me about it, as she wasn't allowed to play games etc. I always thought it strange that she should go like that as she was an only child of 'older' parents with a limited life span anyway, but as someone said 'life is often stranger than fiction'

I hope you might find some of the above of interest. I still have a good memory and very few ills seeing, as Gerry Bailey tells me 'we are now pushing 80,' so cannot complain!

Best wishes to everyone and thanks for all your work to keep the news coming.
